Goals of SPANISH 2002: By the end of the semester, you should be able to do the following:

1. Engage in dialogue with classmates and instructor about situations in the past, present, and future; discuss daily activities, likes and dislikes, give advice and suggest group activities, express hope and desire as well as judgment and feelings;
2. Understand "edited" narration from the instructor, from the video or audio component, and from classmates;
3. Read authentic material from the popular press as well as a few literary pieces and understand the main points;
4. Write about a cultural text that was read or analyzed;
5. Know basic concepts of a typical Hispanic family, Hispanics in U.S.A., alternative medicine, pre-Colombian civilizations, environmental problems that face Spanish speaking and other countries, and be able to discuss these topics within a comparative and contrastive framework.

***Other written and oral work** is based on participation, homework, listening and oral activities, self-study lab activities assigned by the instructor, etc. Every instructor will tailor this portion of the grade according to his or her discretion. **Your attendance and participation will also comprise this grade.** Due to the nature of language acquisition, it is mandatory that you attend all classes and that you participate actively. Your professor will assign you a participation grade. In addition, you are allowed 4 absences without penalty on MWF classes and 2 absences without penalty for TR classes. This should take care of any emergency situation, school-related trips, religious observances or illness. After 4 (MWF) / 2 (TR) absences, your instructor will deduct 1 point (MWF) / 1.5 (TR) per absence from the 15% allotted to the "Other written, oral work and participation" grade; this means that after 15 (MWF) / 10 (TR) absences your grade for that section will be zero.

Laboratory classes: Your class will meet in four laboratory sessions and you will receive a grade for that day's work. If you miss a lab you will receive a zero. No lab sessions may be made up. In addition, you have to practice your listening and speaking skills outside of class in the self-study lab (Gilbert Hall 113) with materials accompanying the text as well as other language resources.

Missed work: There are no make-ups of daily work, i.e. quizzes, homework or other classroom assessments. No late work will be accepted. There is no extra credit. If you miss a partial exam due to any excused absence, your final examination will replace that zero. Only one partial exam may be made up this way. Your professor will determine which absences are excusable.

Final examination: The final exam will be given according to the schedule in the Oasis: Friday, May 6th, 2005, 7:00 pm-10:00 pm. Conflicts with other final examinations should be resolved early in the semester. You must present documentation from the Office of the Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost, Room 110 Old College to obtain authorization to take your final at a date later than that scheduled.

One make-up exam will be given the wok/weekday following the regularly scheduled exam (Monday, May 9th, 2005, 8:00am-11:00am). Final exams will not be given at an earlier date for any reason. A grade of I (incomplete) is given only when you are unable to take the written final due to an emergency situation. **If you know that you cannot be present for the final exam, do not take this course.**

Student concerns: If you have a concern about your Spanish class, try to resolve it with your instructor first. Student grades: Your instructor will grade and return exams, compositions and other assignments in a timely fashion. By the last day of class, you will be provided with a summary of your grades up to the final exam.

Class withdrawal: You may withdraw from this class and receive a grade of **W** up to the mid-point withdrawal deadline of the semester, Tue, Mar. 8th, 2005. After this date, you will receive a grade of **WF**. Students who miss more than 15 classes during the semester on a Monday, Wednesday, Friday schedule, or more than 10 classes during the semester on a Tuesday, Thursday schedule will not be allowed to take the final exam. An instructor may initiate a withdrawal for lack of attendance.
